#### Theme Overview





## WHO?

### Who is Sir Ranulph Fiennes?

According to The Guinness Book of World Records (1984), Sir Ranulph is 'The World's Greatest Living Explorer', travelling far and wide to complete expeditions, not only for his own goals, but also to raise money for charity. He has been an inspiration to many for his bravery, stamina, perseverance and endurance. Even Queen Elizabeth II recognised his achievements and work for charity by awarding him the Order of the British Empire in 1993, giving him the title of 'Sir' Ranulph Fiennes.



## WHERE?

#### Where did / does Sir Ranulph Fiennes live?



Sir Ranulph was born in 1944 in a town called Windsor in England.

Sadly, because his father died just before Sir Ranulph was born, he and his mother moved to South Africa where his grandmother lived.

Sir Ranulph then returned to England at the age of 13 in order to attend school and college in England.

Today, Sir Ranulph still lives in England but travels to many other countries, exploring the globe!

### What?

#### What were some of Sir Ranulph's greatest expeditions?

In 1968, he led the first hovercraft expedition up the longest river in the world (the Nile).

From 1979 to 1982, Sir Ranulph completed The Transglobe Expedition which meant he was the first to reach both Poles, crossing the Antarctic and Arctic Ocean unsupported and being the first and only person to circumnavigate the globe along its polar axis.



In 2005, he climbed Mount Everest, raising £2 million for the British Heart Foundation charity.

In 2007, Sir Ranulph climbed the North Face of the Eiger, raising £1.8 million for Marie Curie Cancer Care charity.
