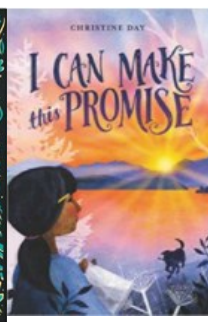
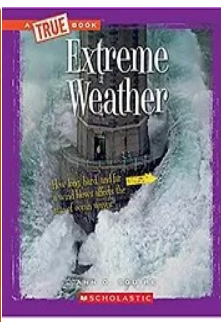
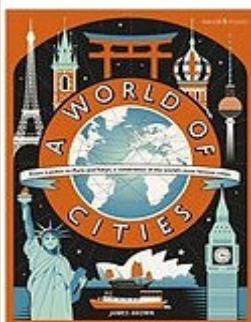


Theme Overview

We will also study weather and climate, as well as human and physical features.

What we should know...

Key Dates

Christopher Columbus landed in America in 1492. The discovery of America by the first Europeans brought opportunities for many to travel there and make a new life.

The American States

There are 50 states in America, the largest of which is Alaska. This is characterised by its Tundra.

Thanksgiving Day

Thanksgiving Day is celebrated in October (Canada) or November (USA). Families get together and have a traditional meal that includes turkey and pumpkin pie. It is a time of celebrating, originally to thank God for the Harvest, as the first Puritan pilgrims did in 1621 when they had their first harvest in America, after leaving England.

Indigenous People

When Columbus landed, Native Americans had already lived there for hundreds of years. He referred to them as 'Indians' as he thought he had landed in the East Indies. The largest Native American tribes are the Navajo, Cherokee and Sioux people.

Key Places

North America is split into six regions:-

Canada, Greenland, Mexico, United States, Central America and the Caribbean.

Human Geography: The White House, Golden Gate Bridge, Statue of Liberty, Disneyland.

Physical Geography: Grand Canyon, Mount Rushmore, Niagra Falls, Mississippi River, Rocky Mountains

The American Dream

This is the hope that anyone can become rich and /or famous if they work hard and try their best. People from other countries migrate to America for the chance of work, equal rights, freedom of speech etc. The Statue of Liberty is the symbol of 'The American Dream'. It was a gift of friendship from France and was built by Gustave Eiffel (who also built the Eiffel Tower).



Key Vocabulary you should discuss with your child

Country: a nation with its own government, occupying a particular territory

Continent: a very large area of land, such as Africa or Asia, that consists of several countries

Indigenous: original settlers of a given region

Migrate: to move to another country

Persecution: terrible treatment

Pilgrim: somebody who makes a long journey for a religious reason

Puritan: a strict form of Protestant Christianity

Region: a particular area or part of the world

Stars and Stripes: the national flag of the US, with fifty white stars representing the fifty American states

State: a place with its own government and borders within a larger country

Tolerance: a willingness to accept behaviour and beliefs that are different from your own

Tundra: large, flat, treeless Arctic region of North America in which the subsoil is permanently frozen
